### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course aims to develop foundational skills in the **Nepali language**, focusing on effective communication for academic, cultural, and everyday contexts. It covers key phonological elements, essential grammar (person, number, gender, case, tense), and practical vocabulary use. Students will also learn to write structured essays and formal/informal letters. The course supports the multilingual vision of the **NEP**, promoting linguistic competence, cultural awareness, and employability.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

This course aims to:

- Develop foundational communicative competence in the Nepali language.
- Familiarise students with key elements of word structure, including **nouns**, **pronouns**, **verbs**, **adjectives**, **compound words** (**samas**), and **sound combinations** (**sandhi**).
- Strengthen grammar usage through core categories such as tense, case, number, gender, and voice.
- Enhance vocabulary with a focus on synonyms, antonyms, and terminology related to culture and administration.
- Train students to write structured **essays** on cultural, social, and literary topics, and compose **formal and informal letters** for real-life communication.
